Warrant Articles

To the inhabitants of the Town of Temple, NH in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Temple, on Tuesday, the Tenth Day of March 2015 next, at ten o'clock in the morning, to act on the following subjects.

Article 1: To cast your ballots for the election of all officers required to be elected to serve the Town of Temple for the ensuing year.

Article 2: To see if the Town of Temple, NH shall vote to adopt the provisions of RSA 40:13 (known as SB 2) to allow official ballot voting on all issues before the Town of Temple, NH on the second Tuesday of March. (3/5 majority vote needed) (By petition).

Article 3: To cast your ballots on the proposed amendments to the Temple Zoning Ordinance. First amendment is a change to Article VIII, Section 2. The second amendment is a petition to change Article IV Section 28.

THE POLLS SHALL OPEN AT TEN O'CLOCK IN THE MORNING. AND SHALL CLOSE NOT EARLIER THAN SEVEN O'CLOCK IN THE EVENING.

You are further notified to meet at the Temple Elementary School in said Temple, on Saturday, the fourteenth Day of March 2015 next, at ten o'clock in the morning, to act on the following:

Article 4: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Sixty Four Thousand dollars (\$164,000.00) for the purpose of purchasing a loader for the Temple Highway Department and associated costs, and to authorize the Selectmen to trade in or sell the current loader, and to authorize the issuance of not more than \$164,000.00 in bonds or notes in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (RSA 33) and to authorize the Municipal Officials to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon. (2/3 Ballot vote required). (Selectmen recommend 2 to 1)

Article 5: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twelve Thousand Five Hundred Two dollars (\$12,502.00) for the purpose of purchasing new computers with upgraded operating systems and software for the Temple Town Offices. (Selectmen recommend)

Article 6: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,338,787.00 for town charges as the operating budget and other necessary maintenance and operating expenditures. (Selectmen recommend)

Article 7: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fourteen Thousand Seven Hundred Seventy Five dollars (\$14,775.00), which is 39% of the total cost, for the purpose of purchasing a new cruiser for the Temple/Greenville Police Department. This article is contingent upon passage of a similar warrant article by the Town of Greenville for the remaining cost of the cruiser. (Selectmen recommend)

Article 8: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eleven Thousand dollars (\$11,000.00) for the purpose of purchasing a new lawn mower for the Temple Highway Department for use in at the cemeteries, ball fields and common. (Selectmen recommend)

Article 9: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twelve Thousand Twenty Five dollars (\$12,025.00) for the purpose of purchasing a set of "Jaws of Life" for the Temple Fire Department. (Selectmen recommend 2 to 1)

Article 10: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen Thousand dollars (\$15,000.00) to be placed in the Highway Department Vehicle Maintenance and Repair Expendable Trust Fund previously established by Article #3, March 12, 2010 Town Meeting under the provisions of RSA 31:19-a. (Selectmen recommend)

Article 11: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Eight Hundred dollars (\$3,800) to purchase a Stryker Power Pro Stretcher for the 2007 ambulance, which is 20% of the total cost. This article is contingent upon passage of similar warrant articles by the towns of Wilton and Lyndeborough for the remaining cost of the stretcher. (Selectmen recommend)

Warrant Articles

Article 12: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred dollars (\$200.00) to support the Big Brothers/Big Sisters of Western New Hampshire. (This expenditure would become part of the budget in subsequent years if passed). (Selectmen recommend)

Article 13: To see if the Town will vote to discontinue completely the last 400' of Blood Road. This would make the total length of Blood Road 1,775' instead of the 2,175' that it presently measures.



Select Board Report

The year 2014 provided the usual number of challenges but now looking back we had a number of major accomplishments and successes as well.

Perhaps the best news was the replacement of Converse Road Bridge.

This project has been several years in the works, taking a large amount of time and effort by the Road Agent but also the select board. There was a distressing moment just prior to the final delivery of the pre-cast arches when it appeared the engineers would not approve the arches. Intense discussions and a site visit to the casting shop by the engineering firm solved the problem but it was a very uneasy day all around. The final cleanup and railings installation will take place in the spring but the hard work is done and the bridge is fully operational. Our thanks to Tim Fiske for his hard work and perseverance in bringing this project to a successful conclusion.

We worked with the Fire Department to clarify a number of insurance and organizational issues that will help us all going forward. The grant that the Fire Department had hoped would cover the new airpacks did not come through but the town was able to finance their purchase at an attractive rate of 2.29% for 5 years.

We spent a number of meetings developing a new employee manual that we anticipate approving in early 2015. The manual has been long overdue and should serve to clarify matters for all town employees.

We continued to work with residents regarding the removal of junk and to correct zoning violations.

We accepted the retirement of Bruce Fox who has served the town highway department well for 20 years. We welcome his replacement, Steve Hruska, and hope for an equally long relationship.

The revaluation of the town was completed with properties generally down about 8%. The new tax rate was up a bit as a result in order to raise the same amount of revenue.

Other good news was the completion of the legal work on the Town Forest conservation easement that had been accepted at the 2014 town meeting. Our

thanks to the Conservation Commission for completing this work.

The new ambulance was put into place and Fairpoint completed the extension of broadband services to the areas of town that had either no service or poor service.

Discussions have continued with a religious group regarding their purchase of private property to be converted into a monastery in the northern part of Town.

A surprise invitation came from the Wilton Select board to "perambulate" our common border. This is required every seven years by state law.

While all of our 2014 bills are not yet in we expect to finish the year with a surplus that will again be available to reduce taxes for 2015.

Your selectmen continued to meet with ConVal's administration and Board on a number of financial and structural matters. Retaining our elementary school and the District's quality of education while controlling costs were the focus of our attention.

Capital Improvements Program Report

The New Hampshire legislature established RSA 674:5-8 to encourage towns to develop Capital Improvement Plans in order to anticipate and plan financially for major expenses. Temple's first Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) was developed in 2004 with assistance from all of the Town's Departments. The resulting plan was intended to be a living document that would be updated each year to reflect the town's changing needs. The CIP has updated that plan in each subsequent year providing recommendations to the Select Board for consideration at Town Meeting.

The CIP committee's goal is to try and keep the Capital Improvements budget as flat as possible, while emphasizing protection of current infrastructure and town services.

In 2014/15 the CIP Committee met with each Town department to review and discuss all potential revisions for the 2015-2024 CIP Plan. To assure continuity of discussion from year to year each department also provides a CIP Expenditure Request Form as well as up-to-date written quotes for all items requested.

For 2015, the ongoing bond payments are:

Fire Department: 9 Air Packs, Air Cylinders, and Booster were purchased in 2014: The price was \$62,500 but due to a generous anonymous donor contribution of \$5,000 the cost to the town was reduced to \$57,500. This amount was financed for 5 years at 2.29%. The 2015 payment of \$13,811 is the first of 5 payments. Interest paid over the 5 years will be \$3,410.

Town Government: The Skladany Land: The Town of Temple voted to purchase this land in March of 2005. The final payment of \$42,515 is scheduled for this year in 2015.

Highway Department: The 2014 International Dump Truck was purchased in 2013 at a cost of \$160,258 and financed at 2.15% for six years. Total interest will be \$12,128. The 2015 payment of **\$29,620** is the second of 6 payments.

For 2015, the CIP Committee recommends the following projects:

Fire Department: The CIP Committee recommends a warrant article of \$12,025 for Jaws of Life (Cutter and Edraulic Bank Charger only) in 2015.

Highway Department: The CIP recommends a warrant article of \$159,000 for the replacement of the 1995 CAT Loader. The CIP recommends this purchase to be financed.

Highway Department: Cemetery: The CIP recommends a warrant article of \$11,000 for the replacement of the 2004 cemetery lawn mower.


Police Department: The CIP recommends a warrant article of \$14,775 for Temple's share (39%) of the purchase of new vehicle as a replacement of the 2007 Nissan Pathfinder. The total estimated cost of the vehicle is \$37,884 (\$42,884 less \$5,000 from the Detail Fund).

Town Government: The CIP recommends a warrant article of \$12,502 for computers for the Town offices.

Town Government: Town Buildings: Town Hall: The CIP recommends continuing the program for exterior painting that began in 2014. The schedule and proposed cost for each side is: South side – \$3,200 (completed in 2014), East - \$4,000 (2015), North - \$3,200 (2016), West - \$3,900 (2017). The CIP further recommends that this project be financed through the Town's annual operating budget and/or capital reserves.

Budget Advisory Committee

For the 2015 budget year, the BAC met their goal of providing an operating budget with combined recommendations for warrant articles that meets the needs of our department heads while maintaining the tax rate most recently paid in 2014. After reviewing the entire budget and interviewing various department heads, the BAC recommends the following:

- 1. The 2015 budget total of \$1,290,999 before any cost of living increases.
- 2. The BAC recommends retaining the existing loader. The board felt that the budget is burdened with enough debt payments and that looking into next year to start capital reserve funds for large purchases would be more prudent.
- 3. The BAC recommends \$25,000 to be placed into the expendable trust for highway department vehicle maintenance and repair. This amount was discussed to insure against any major repairs on existing loader.
- 4. The BAC recommends \$5000 to be placed into the expendable trust for bridge repair and maintenance.
- 5. The BAC does not recommend the purchase of a new police cruiser. The board felt it should be purchased after the contract negotiations in 2016.
- 6. The BAC does not recommend the purchase of a new lawn mower.
- 7. The BAC recommends the purchase of new computer and equipment. The board also recommends an expendable trust for computer repair and maintenance.
- 8. The BAC recommends the purchase of new Jaws of Life cutter assembly for the fire department. The board discussed the need to upgrade the rest of the components next year.
- 9. The BAC did not discuss the article for Big Brothers/Big Sisters.
- 10. The BAC did not discuss the ambulance request for a new stretcher.

 The board did not have any information given during budgeting sessions.

In conclusion, the BAC recommends a total gross budget (with warrant articles) for 2015 of \$1,345,026 or less. The BAC recommends using \$49,000 from the asphalt and paving expendable trust to handle any cost overruns in

the budget. The anticipated revenue from other sources is \$408,325. This recommendation would suggest an approximate tax rate of \$6.73 for 2015 without the use of unreserved fund balance. This reflects a 1.5% increase from 2014 rate of \$6.63 before the use of fund balance to reduce the rate.





In 2015, we will be asking for a new lawnmower. This is needed to mow the three cemeteries, two ball fields, and the town common and lawns. This will replace the mower that we purchased in 2002.

Highway Department

January 2014 was not a typical January. We had as much rain as we did snow and the temperatures ranged from -10° to 55°. This type of weather is extremely hard on the paved roads so the frost heaves and potholes were probably the worst I have ever seen. We got close to 50" of snow in the month of February and the temperatures held below freezing but the maple sap still ran some. The bankings were high enough so that we put the wing on the grader to push them back. The cold nights dragged on into March with several nights getting below zero but the weather stayed fairly quiet.

We spent a lot of time in April and May working on our gravel roads. The temperatures fluctuated between below freezing nights to above 70° on some days. This helped to pull the frost out of the ground slowly so our "mud season" was not very bad. It was close to June before some of the roads dried out.

The Veteran's maple tree in front of the church was dying. It was removed and a young oak tree was planted in its place. Just in time for Memorial Day.

Even though it was a fairly wet summer, many things happened and got done:

- We awarded the contract to Cold River Bridge Co. to build a new bridge on Converse Rd.
- Cold River Bridge Co. removed Converse Rd. Bridge #1, built a temporary bridge, and poured cement footings for a new precast cement bridge.
- We poured a cement abutment under the east side of Converse Rd. Bridge #2.
- We finished landscaping the area next to East Cemetery for a new cemetery.
- 40' of Boutwell Hill Rd. and 400' of Hadley Hwy. was dug out and rebuilt, then repaved. We continued the new pavement to Cutter Rd.
- We had a company come in and crush up about 1100 yards of old pavement that we had collected over the years. We used this for our road-rebuilding project as base material.
- Other sections of Hadley Hwy. and all of Glen Farm Rd. were sand sealed.
- All of the roadsides were mowed.

In October, we were back to getting ready for winter again. We graded the gravel roads, piled up our winter sand, and prepared the equipment for snow and ice, etc. The first good storm came on Thanksgiving Day with about 14" of

snow. There were numerous power outages in central and eastern N.H., but not for us. After a few more light storms, it warmed up, the snow melted, and we had a brown Christmas. Thanks to the warmer days, the Cold River Bridge Co. was able to deliver and put in place the precast bridge sections for Converse Rd. Bridge #1. It was opened to traffic on December 31st. They will finish landscaping around it, installing the guardrail, and removing the temporary bridge in the spring after the ground thaws.

Bruce Fox retired after working for the Temple Highway Department for 20 years. I wish him the best and hope he gets to enjoy many years of rest and relaxation, not sliding around on the icy roads or pushing snow.



It's hard to believe that the merged police department is now 10 years old. Over that time we have saved over a million dollars and reduced our crime rate. I know that the combined efforts of our citizens, selectmen, officers and employees have made this a reality.

The police department has made several improvements over the past year. One major improvement was the upgrade of our base station radio. This allows us to communicate directly with officers on the road. Prior to that, we would have to call the dispatch center to relay a message. Every employee of the department has performed some type of maintenance, from painting, carpentry to grounds keeping. This helps to keep our maintenance costs low.

Our officers are continually improving their training. In 2014, officers were trained and have been certified in rifle, prosecution, and crisis negotiations. This is in addition to their annual training including firearms, policies, and Taser recertification.

I appreciate all the time and effort that the Joint Police Board members, officers and administrative staff have put in. Thank you!

For the past several years The Temple-Greenville Police Department has participated in ConVal's internship program. This allows a senior student to shadow an on-duty officer. Town of Wilton Ambulance Department

The Town of Wilton Ambulance just completed its 40th year of service. The Wilton Lyndeborough Volunteer Ambulance and Rescue Association was formed in 1974 and endures to this day as the Town of Wilton Ambulance. In the above pictures you can see the stark contrast in the forty year history of the service. We have moved from one Cadillac ambulance in the Wilton Town Hall to two state of the art Advanced Life Support ambulances in our Forest Road facility. Our first members took an 80 hour Advanced First Aid or EMT Class. Now, our members take an EMT Class at least 180 hours, our Advanced EMT's take a 250 hour class and our Paramedics take have well over 2000 hours of training that is equivalent to a college degree. We would like to thank all the members of our service, past and present, that have served our community for the past forty years. This has been a true neighbor helping neighbor organization. The Town of Wilton Ambulance has come a long way in 40 years, and even this year we have made some significant advances. We have purchased our new 2014 PL Custom Ambulance and retained use of our old 2001 ambulance, if needed.

With the purchase of our new ambulance, power stretcher, and mobile radio repeater, you have made our job safer, easier, and more efficient. With the "Medic in Mind" set up in the new ambulance, we can remain seated during transport and access most of what we need without unbuckling our seat belt while traveling. With the power stretcher we do not have to lift as much, and saves our staff from potential injuries. With the mobile radio repeater, we can reach dispatch from most all areas that we service without having to run back out to the ambulance to request assistance.

As part of an agreement with the Town of Milford Ambulance, we traded them our old ambulance. Milford is using our old ambulance as a backup ambulance. If one of our ambulances goes out of service, we are able to borrow our old ambulance at no cost to the taxpayers of Wilton. Because of this, we should have two ambulances in service at all times. This has already proven beneficial to the Town of Wilton Ambulance in December.

As we have said in past years, thank you for your support over the past year, and in the future, we do appreciate it. We are also always looking for members, and you do not have to have any medical experience, we will train you. If you're interested, give us a call. We'd love to have you on board.

Volunteer Fire/Rescue Department

2014 turned out to be a busy year for the Temple Volunteer Fire Department. Not only was it a busy year but it was a year of changes. In January, Chief Mike Connolly stepped down after a 10-year dedication as Chief, he remains as a valued member of the department and his dedication continues to be greatly appreciated. I, George Clark, was nominated, voted and happily accepted the position as Chief. Within the first 3 months the department experienced two structure fires and a major chimney fire. As a newly appointed Chief I was not only impressed and proud of the men and women that belong to the Temple Volunteer department, but appreciative to the mutual aid towns that assisted with these calls. Our safety during emergency situations depends on their volunteerism and dedication and for that I thank them.

In December, the department received our new Self-Contained Breathing Apparatus (SCBA). We made an attempt to receive and applied for a federal grant but unfortunately were denied, however the town was able to assist us with this dire need to replace our 20 year old non-compliant SCBA equipment. In January we began training with the new equipment and have made the smooth transition with all members now having their own dependable equipment. We would like to extend our sincere appreciation and gratitude to the Citizens of Temple for making this possible. With this new equipment not only will we as properly equipped rescue personnel be safer, but we will be able to assist each and every one of you confidently should an emergency arise within your family.

This year I have made another attempt at applying for a federal grant, the demand for grant money is high nation wide, but our chances at an award are as good as the next town. Almost immediately, it was brought to my attention the need for a new set of jaws. This equipment is necessary for numerous situations, especially when it comes to car extrication. Our current set, which was a replacement to our previous pair, was built in 1995. As the auto industry has made improvements to create safer cars it has proven to be more difficult, if not impossible to utilize in an emergency situation. They cannot cut through the metal that the car frames are being made of. In order for us to be able to expedite an emergency situation with an entrapped passenger, we need to have this modern equipment and not reply on mutual aid to respond causing delay in treatment to the patient. It is our hopes that we receive this grant to not only bring modern, dependable equipment to the department but to lighten our financial need from the town. We shall keep you posted on this endeavor.

TVFD is always looking for volunteers to come join us. As a volunteer department we are looking for assistance in any capacity that an individual is able to give such positions include: Firefighters, Fire Scene Support Personnel Drivers/Operators, Incident Support Personnel, First Responder EMT's, and Maintenance personnel.

Training is not necessary. We provide the equipment and the necessary training as well as all the support that you need to become a safe member of the department. It is our ultimate goal to have every member return to their family after each call. TVFD accepts and encourages individuals from age 14 on up to join. On behalf of the Fire Department I would like to extend our sincere gratitude to former Chief Mike Connolly for the 10yrs he gave as Fire Chief. During this time he was able to establish a solid department and get us pointed in the right direction. I look forward to working with all the members of the department and the Officers as we continue to improve our department in making sure my members receive appropriate up to date training and return home safely after each call. I would also like to say thank you to Don Kraemer for his 20+ yrs he dedicated to TVFD as a volunteer.

Temple Town Forester

For the tax year April 1, 2013 through March 31, 2014, the Town received ten Reports of Wood or Timber Cut. Yield taxes assessed for these harvesting operations totaled \$14,020.12 As of January 22, 2015, seven Intents to Cut have been filed with the Town for the current tax year. Demand for forest products in our area continues to be very strong and stable. Good quality white pine and hemlock continue to command a strong stumpage price. Hardwood pulp and firewood continue to be very much in demand in spite of lower oil prices this winter. Stumpage prices for Red Oak and other hardwood continued to increase over the past year to the highest they have been in about 15 years. Pricing for hardwood has leveled off and should remain stable all year.

The State RSA specifies that any person owning land upon which wood or timber is cut, either for sale or for services rendered, must first file an Intent to Cut form with the Town Selectmen or assessing officials. The exception to this is a person cutting up to 10,000 board feet of logs or up to 20 cords of fuel wood for either their own use or for a land conversion. Under these exceptions an individual does not have to file an Intent to Cut form. The tax year runs from April 1st to March 31st.

The RSA also states that within 60 days of completion of the operation or by May 15th, a Report of Wood or Timber Cut must be filed with the Town specifying the exact volume cut by species. The Town will levy a 10 percent yield tax based on the stumpage value of the material cut. This value is not based on the actual price paid for the forest products but on average values provided by the State. If the job is not completed by March 31st or did not take place, a Report of Cut must still be filed by May 15th. At that time a new Intent to Cut should be filed to renew the permit. If the job is not completed by March 31st but will be completed by June 30th, a 90-day extension may be granted without having to renew the permit. To do this the Selectmen must be notified in writing by the Owner, prior to May 15th. Finally, during a harvesting operation, if the volumes to be harvested are going to exceed the estimated volumes on the original Intent to Cut, a supplemental Intent should be filed immediately showing the additional estimated volumes.

Landowners considering a timber harvest should be aware that there are State harvesting regulations that must be followed. If you have any questions regarding this or the permitting process, you can contact me through the Selectmen's Office.




Your local Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department, and the State of New Hampshire Division of Forests & Lands, work collaboratively to reduce the risk and frequency of wildland fires in New Hampshire. To help us assist you, please contact your local Forest Fire Warden or Fire Department to determine if a permit is required before doing ANY outside burning. Under State law (RSA 227-L:17) a fire permit is required for all outside burning, unless the ground is completely covered with snow. The New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services also prohibits the open burning of household waste. Citizens are encouraged to contact the local fire department or DES at (603) 271-1370 or www.des.state.nh.us for more information. Safe open burning requires diligence and responsibility. Help us to protect New Hampshire's forest resources. For more information please contact the Division of Forests & Lands at (603) 271-2214, or online at www.nhdfl.org.

This past fire season started in early April with the first reported fire on April 7th. April, which is the traditional start to our spring fire season, began very dry with unseasonably dry conditions continuing through the entire month. This dry pattern continued through the first half of May. 80% of our reported fires this season occurred during this six week period. The largest fire was 24 acres, occurring in the town of Tamworth. From mid May through early September, above average rainfall kept our total acreage burned statewide at 72 acres. This is the smallest amount of acreage burned statewide in several years. Late August through late September though brought a dry trend to northern areas, resulting in several deep-burning remote fires. Our fire danger days correlated well with the days that there were fires actually reported. The statewide system of 16 fire lookout towers continues to operate on Class III or higher fire danger days. Our fire lookouts are credited with keeping most fires small and saving several structures due to their quick and accurate spotting capabilities. The towers fire spotting capability was supplemented by the NH Civil Air Patrol when the fire danger was especially high. Many homes in New Hampshire are located in the wildland urban interface, which is the area where homes and flammable wildland fuels intermix. Several of the fires during the 2014 season threatened structures, and a few structures were burned, a constant reminder that forest fires burn more than just trees. Homeowners should take measures to prevent a wildland fire from spreading to their home. Precautions include keeping your roof and gutters clear of leaves and pine needles, and maintaining adequate green space around your home free of flammable materials. Additional information and homeowner recommendations are available at www.firewise.org. Please help Smokey Bear, your local fire department, and the state's Forest Rangers by being fire wise and fire safe!

Planning Board

During the year there was no activity regarding subdivision of property. However, the board did receive and approve one request for a lot line merger.

After the election in March, newly elected member Tedd Petro was welcomed to the board. The following slate of officers was voted in to serve for the year: Chairman – Rose Lowry; Vice Chairman – Allan Pickman; and Secretary – Randy Martin. In November the board regretfully accepted Lowry's resignation, and Pickman was appointed to serve as Chair for the rest of the term.

Early in the year the board declared its support for the efforts of the town's Conservation Commission to place a conservation easement on the Temple Town Forest. Residents of the town also supported the endeavor, and voted to allow an easement to be held by The Monadnock Conservancy to help ensure future protection of the property.

The board's major project for the year was to begin work on revising the town's Master Plan. A strategy was developed to create a new chapter style format, and a preliminary list of topics was generated so initial research and gathering of data could begin. This important work will continue into the upcoming year.

During early springtime it was learned that Buddhist monks were interested in establishing a Forest Monastery on the Kantner property in the north end of town. This presented a host of unique circumstances and questions, and as the year drew to a close it was evident the project is taking shape and will move forward. The Planning Board expects to learn more and have direct contact in response to further project development.

In August the board met with developers who proposed a plan to revitalize the Old Brick School building located on Hadley Highway into a small apartment complex. A variance had been granted by the Zoning Board of Adjustment that would allow three apartments, pending a Site Plan Review process with the Planning Board. After several meetings, a public hearing, and comments from abutters, the owners were granted final approval in November.

Various aspects related to the topic of Agriculture were discussed throughout the year. The board decided to propose changes to zoning they felt would protect both farmers and abutters. Two zoning amendments were proposed, and provided active and lively debate during a pair of public hearings. After listening to concerns from residents, the board withdrew one proposal and simplified another. It was also decided to establish an ad-hoc Agriculture Committee of local farmers to serve as an advisory resource.

My thanks go to board members and to Betsy Perry for all their hard work and dedication during the past year. Especial thanks to Rose Lowry, for her years of service and leadership.

Conservation Commission

Conservation Commission members are grateful for the 2014 Town Meeting's strong vote to permanently protect the Temple Town Forest on the north side of Town. As reported in last year's Annual Reports, this brings a sense of fulfillment to work that started in 1978 when the Town Meeting charged the TCC with caring for the natural character, health, recreation uses, and sustainable silvaculture of this 54-acre parcel. The TCC worked in 2014 with the Monadnock Conservancy to carry out a survey and finalize the easement.

The Commission began work this year on three projects and would welcome citizens' input on these. The first is developing a policy for activities on Town conservation lands. Guidelines used by other CC's and organizations are being considered. For example, members agreed it would not serve the safety and educational and recreational purposes of the Town Forest to allow trapping. But tapping maple trees, if done conscientiously, can help maintain walking trails and healthy tree growth, as seen in the Town Forest.

The second project involves identifying and inventorying farmland and working with landowners and farmers to help sustain diverse agricultural activities, healthy lands, and a pool of new farmers for the future. The NH Climate Action Plan's 2008 draft report on agriculture and forestry describes using cover crops and no-till farming to increase soil carbon content and nitrogen holding capacity, which can reduce fertilizer use, greenhouse gases, and related causes of climate instability. Conservation easements designed to reduce subdivision, paving over, and fragmentation of land are a primary tool to preserve carbon storage and food growing capacities of agricultural lands and forests.

A third project is to involve our children and the Temple Elementary School in field trips to farms and forests. The Commission is proposing a Conservation Day that would involve children, teachers, and parents in outdoor activities that help maintain our open spaces, plants and animals, and natural systems.

Commission members appreciate your interest and participation in any of these above projects and in joining our monthly meetings on the second Monday at 6:30 PM. Our agendas are posted at the Town Office and Temple Store in advance. We have openings for new members and invite you to contact any member about this rewarding service to our town and local environment.

Temple Economical Energy Committee

Last spring, Temple's Energy Committee (TEEC) and Recreation Committee joined forces to co-sponsor a solar project for the 4th graders at Temple's Elementary School. We collaborated with the school's science teacher, Steve Lechner, to create a plan that integrated parts of the science curriculum with an opportunity for the kids to build miniature solar-powered vehicles. To introduce the project, we visited their classroom and had a spirited conversation about the importance of protecting our environment and about the power of sunlight to help with that. The kids could hardly wait to see for themselves how the sun can make power. With Mr. Lechner's guidance, they worked in pairs to construct their vehicles, conduct various science experiments, and eventually race them outside in the school parking lot on a sunny day in June. Photos of the process and races were later uploaded to the "Kids Corner" page of TEEC's website, www.teec.info, to share with kids around the world.

One of our main efforts in 2014 was the production of a free, updated local business guide to encourage more local shopping and reduce commuting. Giving folks a fresh look at all that is available right here in town, the "Temple Guide to Local Business, Services and Farms" has 120 listings, each with updated contact information. The 100 copies we distributed at our Harvest Festival booth went like hotcakes, and we'll have more for next year's booth. Bound copies were made for the Municipal Building, library, and Willard's store for folks to use on site.

We also created a user-friendly website for the guide called the Temple Exchange, www.templeexchange.com. Residents can add their own new listings or alter their listings online by following the prompts on the site. A special feature of the guide, both online and in print, is that there are numerous listings of business owner's offering to trade or exchange services, an hour for an hour, as well as using cash for currency.

The Energy Committee was also busy:

- Recycling for Town Meeting, Good Roads Day, 4th of July, Harvest Festival, and TES.
- Updating **TEEC's website**, <u>www.teec.info</u>, with energy saving tips, environment and climate news, links to the Energy Chapter for Temple's Master Plan, Power Points on our municipal retrofit and sustainability, uploads to the Kids Corner page, and more.

- Offering hand-outs at our Harvest Festival booth on energy conservation, renewable power, copies of the new local business guide, raffle tickets for free energy audits, etc.
- Providing information in Temple's Newsletter on "Button Up NH" Workshops, regional & state programs for low-cost energy efficiency upgrades and solar installations, etc.
- Maintaining our Free Home Weatherization Program for residents.
- Assisting homeowners seeking referrals and resources for energy audits, energy efficiency improvements and renewable installations.
- Participating in regional discussions focused on such opportunities as the
 potential installation of an extra-large solar PV array that would be "group
 net metered" to serve multiple towns with municipal sector utility needs. As
 a result of those discussions a grant application to the PUC was filed for the
 group array, and is still pending.

Temple Town Hall Advisory Committee

The Temple Board of Selectmen (BOS) established the Temple Town Hall Advisory Committee (TTHAC) in 2010 to act as stewards of this town building, supporting the BOS in an advisory capacity.

The primary purpose of the TTHAC is to assist in monitoring the use and condition of the Town Hall, advising the Select Board on any issues arising that might impact the building's functionality or appearance. This will ensure that the facility remains a vibrant community center for education, enrichment and general enjoyment, and that its historic, functional and financial values are protected on behalf of all current and future Temple residents. Additionally, this will assist the Town in fulfilling its obligation to preserve the Town Hall in the same structural condition and state of repair as when its rehabilitation was completed, in accordance with but not limited to, the terms of the Stewardship Agreement that exists between the Town of Temple and the NH Land and Community Heritage Investment Program (LCHIP). Extending beyond the LCHIP agreement timeframe, the existence of this advisory committee will ensure that the same spirit of Town Hall stewardship is carried forth, and that the preservation of this building continues in perpetuity.

On April 23, 2014, the Committee met and reviewed reappointment requests submitted by members whose terms were expiring. Based upon the TTHAC's unanimous recommendation, the BOS voted to reappoint Connie Kieley and Sydney Thomas to their positions. Minutes from our October 22, 2013 meeting were also reviewed and unanimously approved. A discussion concerning the Town Hall not always being properly cleaned or reorganized by Town-affiliated groups who use the facility followed. There have been reports of a Town Board, Committee or Organization arriving to set up for an event, and finding they had to spend time and energy cleaning up from the previous users before proceeding. Anyone encountering a similar situation can relate to the frustration and disappointment this can cause. The benefits associated with having a community gathering place the caliber of the Temple Town Hall are immeasurable. Ensuring it remains in great condition does require us all to share some responsibility for maintaining its cleanliness. We ask everyone who uses the Hall to please take time at the conclusion of their event to perform at least the following basic tasks: thoroughly wash any tables used, return all chairs and tables to their designated storage areas, clean the kitchen if used, sweep the floors of any debris, return the Main Hall thermostat to its maintenance setting – if you adjusted it upon arrival,

turn off lights not controlled by automatic sensors, and lock all doors upon exiting If we all leave the Town Hall clean and orderly every time we use it, then each of us should be equally pleased with its condition when our turn comes again.

Beginning mid-August and concluding on September 05, 2014, the south exterior wall (church side) of the Town Hall was repainted at a cost of \$2,525. This work was performed in accordance with the one-side-per-year plan to repaint the building's exterior, which was incorporated into the Town's Capital Improvements Plan (CIP) and endorsed by the BOS in 2013. Painting of the Hall's east exterior wall (front) is scheduled for 2015.

On October 22, 2014, our meeting included the annual inspection of the Town Hall's interior and exterior. This process aids in the early detection of potential problems, and provides information needed to prepare the "LCHIP Historic Resources Annual Monitoring Report". Aside from the exterior paint degradation, which is being addressed by the Town's repainting plan, no significant issues were noted.

On October 28, 2014, TTHAC representatives met with the BOS to discuss the "2014 LCHIP Historic Resources Annual Monitoring Report", prepared by our committee on the Town's behalf. Our draft was reviewed and approved by the Select Board. The report was submitted to LCHIP on October 30, 2014.

The TTHAC meets a minimum of two times per year. Our meetings are posted in advance and open to the public. If you are interested in becoming a committee member, please feel free to contact a current member, or simply show up at our next meeting and let us know!

Temple Town Hall Usage Information

LIGHTS & THERMOSTAT CONTROL

When entering the Hall through the front doors:

- If the lights in the vestibule are on when you step in, do not turn them off.
 - o They are controlled by a sensor that automatically turns them on and off.

After passing through the second set of doors, into the Main Hall:

- To your right is a light switch panel that controls the various Main Hall lights
 - o The toggle switch is for the lights directly overhead, beneath the balcony.
 - o The slide switch controls the large ceiling lights within the Main Hall.
- To your left is the thermostat that regulates the Main Hall heat.
 - o To raise the heat: Push the UP button until the digital readout reaches the desired temperature. Then PUSH and HOLD this button to set it at that temperature.
 - o To reset the heat when leaving: Push the "Use Schedule" button on the thermostat. This resets the heat to its normal maintenance level.
 - * Please be sure to reset thermostat to avoid waste of fuel

When entering the Hall through the side door, across from the library:

- There is a **light switch panel to your left**, as you step in
 - o The first switch controls the lights beneath the balcony
 - o The second switch controls the light outside the door you entered

CHAIRS & TABLES

- Chairs are stored in the Main Hall, in the double-door closet beneath the balcony.
 - * Please use caution when moving chair racks in and out of the closet
- Eight-foot tables are also stored in the Main Hall, under the right side of the stage, behind the removable bead board panel.
 - * Please wash tables, if needed, before returning them to storage

MAINTENANCE/CLEAN-UP

• Janitor's Closet: Located in the Main Hall beneath the balcony, to your right as you enter from the vestibule. The janitor's closet contains a wash sink, brooms, bucket, mops, etc. for your use.

• Supplies: Extra paper towels, toilet tissue, etc. are stored in a cupboard at the back of the ADA accessible restroom, located off the main entrance vestibule. The cupboard is a built-in, to the left of the toilet, beneath the balcony stairs.

Village Green Committee

On March 22nd, a Springtime Classic Rock'n'Roll Dance, featuring the Slyders and held at the TTH, served as the first VGC fundraiser of the year. Attendance was fair, but participants had a great time, and \$128 was raised after subtracting the expense of the required police presence.

Early in the year, with direction from the Select Board and the Trustees of the Trust Funds, the VGC developed and clarified its new procedures for handling committee debits/reimbursements and credits/deposits.

In April, the group spearheaded the replacement of the severely stressed Temple Memorial Tree. The VGC worked closely with the Select Board, the Temple Veterans' Association (TVA), the Temple Highway Department, and the Congregational Church of Temple to accomplish this special project. Earlier in the year, Paul Quinn (TVA) and Jon Nute (County Extension Forester), conducted extensive research to determine the type of tree that would best survive on the traditional site in front of the church. A sturdy, salt-tolerant Red Oak was planted, secured with guy wires, well-watered, and mulched in time for the rededication ceremony on Temple Memorial Day.

On May 24th, the VGC focused on the planting of the window boxes, half-barrels, and town garden spaces, with particular attention to the Memorial Bed, in the group's annual effort to beautify the center of the village in time for Temple Memorial Day. The committee also established a watering, weeding, and general care schedule for the town garden areas and the newly planted Memorial Tree.

The VGC Plant Sale was held in the late spring as the group's second fundraiser of the year. Sales went well and brought the high cost of plants down to a net expense of \$307. In 2015, some annuals may be replaced by perennials to reduce expense/labor.

In consultation with Tim Fiske and Jon Nute, the VGC conducted springtime follow-up work on the Common, including the grinding of stumps from trees that had been removed the previous year, the second-year inspection of the five recently planted maple trees, and the survey of the current condition of the fence rails in preparation for the painting project scheduled for next summer.

Later in the fall, the VGC applied for and received a \$900 grant from the 250th Anniversary Fund to be used toward the total estimated cost (\$1875) of the 2015 Common rail painting project.

The third and final VGC fundraising effort for 2014 took place at the traditional Temple Harvest Festival on September 21st. Located under the big tent, the committee's Harvest Table provided a variety of foods and drinks, local crafts, gift items, and harvest products for sale. After adding in a large donation (\$101.25 from hayride income) and subtracting a few non-donated expenses, the VGC was able to deposit a net income of \$521.75 to be used for town projects.

The final committee endeavor for 2014 occurred at the beginning of December with the "greening" of the Common, library window boxes, and village center buildings. Instead of the time-consuming roping of the Common rails, the committee made wreaths from some of the roping and placed them on each side of the three pedestrian entrances (N, S, and W). As always, live wreaths were purchased (\$178) and placed on the doors of all the town buildings. In addition, live greens were donated and placed in the library window boxes.

The VGC is looking ahead to another year of serving the town by helping to take care of its green areas, helping to improve and maintain town landscaping, and providing decoration during the holiday season. Social Services & Statistics

Contoocook Valley Transportation Co.

Now entering our sixth year of service to the 13 towns in the Eastern Monadnock region, CVTC has become a strong thread in the safety-net of human services.

Through the volunteer Driver Program:

- we assist in sustaining and/or improving the health and well-being of riders
- our Volunteer Drivers provide access to essential healthcare, support services, and other basic needs for those who are unable to drive because of age, ability and/or income level.
- we enhance our riders' ability to reclaim, retain, or attain independence by providing for themselves and their family.

CVTC Volunteer Program (VDP)

- Currently, 29 vetted Volunteer Drivers use their own vehicles and provide their own insurance coverage to give rides to non-emergency medical appointments, shopping, and other essential service destinations.
- Drivers donate their time and can receive mileage reimbursement at \$.45/mile from NH DOT grant funds. These funds are matched by either volunteer time or public support donations from foundations, businesses, municipalities, Monadnock United Way, and individuals.
- In calendar year 2014 the annual data shows:
 - o Drivers donated 2.452 hours of service for a value of \$36,780.
 - o Drivers drove 46,874 miles.
 - o 101 unduplicated individuals received rides.
 - o 2,019 trips were provided.
- The Volunteer Driver Program Coordinator works 30 hours/week registering riders' trip requests in *TripList*, our web-based software system. Drivers log in to select the rides they want to give and submit their monthly reports for data collection and mileage reimbursement.

Monadnock Family Services is actively serving residents of the Town of Temple through the provision of quality mental health counseling and rehabilitation services to anyone who needs them-regardless of their ability to pay. In addition to being the region's only emergency mental health crisis service, MFS offers a variety of treatment programs for our community. Our Adult Outpatient Services program provides mental health evaluation and treatment, as well as medication evaluation and monitoring, counseling, and specialized group services. Our Child, Adolescent, & Family Services program is designed to support and promote good mental health in children and every member of the family. The Monadnock Substance Abuse Services program helps people develop new, healthier behaviors and make positive changes in their lives. Our broad array of services to residents of Temple also includes the Monadnock Volunteer Center, In SHAPE for Adults and Children, Acting Out, and the Monadnock Adult Care Center.

Your ongoing support of our work is deeply appreciated, and we hope that our partnership in caring for the residents of Temple will continue. We pursue many other sources of funding, such as the Monadnock United Way, grants, and additional fundraising efforts conducted in concert with our Board of Directors. Each source, however, helps with only a portion of the total cost of care.

We thank you for your many years of financial support and ask for your continued allocation to help underwrite the cost of services we provide to the uninsured and underinsured individuals in your community. In FY 2014, MFS provided over \$18,807 in discounts to our consumers in Temple. We expect that an additional \$2,407 will need to be written off as uncollectible. To help close this gap, we are asking for the equivalent of \$1.25 for each resident of Temple, which, based on the 2010 US Census, amounts to \$1,708.

Your support is very important to us. By working together, we help to insure our communities remain healthy and vital places to live, work, and grow. Thank you for your consideration.

For many years, the Town of Temple has supported our services. I write again to ask for your continuing support. St. Joseph Community Services has been providing vital services to the elderly and disabled adults throughout all of Hillsborough County, and in thirty-seven years of service, we have served close to 12 million meals to this frail and often isolated population, but our services offer more than that. In addition to providing a hot, nutritious meal, we are also providing a safety check, socialization, and access to additional resources.

Although we maximize available funding through cost containment measures, use of volunteers, and significant fundraising efforts, our funding sources have remained flat, or have been reduced. In order to cover the funding gap for each meal that we serve, we must approach the cities and towns, ask for client donations, and utilize events to raise these much needed dollars.

A contribution fro the Town of Temple will assist the residents of your town in need of our services and will help us to continue our mission of promoting the health and welfare of elderly, homebound, and disabled individuals throughout Hillsborough County. Providing nutrition and social engagement to this often isolated population helps support their choice to remain independent and age in place in their own homes within their communities.

Last year, we served 5 Temple residents. Two of these 5 residents were served under our Title XX program, which is sponsored by the County of Hillsborough. We are requesting funding of \$75 for each of the remaining clients, which comes to a total of \$225.

A contribution of \$225 from the Town of Temple will directly help us continue providing your elderly homebound and disabled neighbors with a fundamental need — food — and will help us to continue meeting the increasing need for our services.

Article 1: To cast your ballots for the election of all officers required to be elected to serve the Town of Temple for the ensuing year.

Article 2: To see if the Town of Temple, NH shall vote to adopt the provisions of RSA 40:13 (known as SB 2) to allow official ballot voting on all issues before the Town of Temple, NH on the second Tuesday of March. (3/5 majority vote needed) (By petition)

Article 2 Failed: YES: 284 NO: 196

60% majority of cast votes required to pass. Yes's were at 59%

You are further notified to meet at the Temple Elementary School in said Temple, on Saturday, the fifteenth Day of March next, at ten o'clock in the morning.

Meeting was called to order at 10:03am.

Moderator, Steve Cullinan led the meeting in the Pledge of Allegiance.

Fire Chaplin, Olivia Holmes led the group in a brief prayer.

Casey Jones and Kathy Fedorka, recognized Pricilla Weston for her 50 years of service to the Mansfield Library. Mike Connolly was also thanked for his 10 years of service to the Fire Department.

Article 3: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Sixty Four Thousand dollars (\$64,000.00) for the purpose of purchasing Self Contained Breathing Apparatus for Firefighters and Air Booster Equipment for the Air Compressor to fill the SCBA bottles and to authorize the issuance of not more than \$64,000.00 in bonds or notes in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (RSA 33) and to authorize the Municipal Officials to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon. (2/3 Ballot vote required). (Selectmen recommend)

Article 3 amendment:

DRA provided new language, presented by John Kieley: (adding to the end of the article)...thereon "and to authorize the municipal officials to apply for and accept Federal, State or any and all other aid or revenue that may be or may become available for said purpose."

Motion to amend Article 4 by Tedd Petro, second by Allan Pickman:

"Move to increase the 2014 Temple Town Budget by the sum of \$4,531.00 for the purpose of increasing the "regular" employee wages to 3% versus the $1\frac{1}{2}\%$ in the 2014 proposed budget, (this amount also covers the increase in associated employment taxes).

Amendment failed by card count vote: YES: 58 NO: 61

Article 4 passed by unanimous voice vote.

Article 5: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Forty One Thousand Five Hundred and Twenty dollars (\$41,520.00), which is 20% of the total cost, to purchase a new ambulance for the Wilton Ambulance Service. This article is contingent upon passage of similar warrant articles by the Towns of Wilton and Lyndeborough for the remaining costs of the ambulance. (Selectmen Recommend)

Article 5 moved by John Kieley, second by Mike Darnell

Article 5 passed by unanimous voice vote.

Article 6: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Nine Thousand dollars (\$29,000.00) to be placed in the Asphalt and Paving Expendable Trust Fund previously established by Article #4, March 13, 2010 Town Meeting under the provisions of RSA 31:19-a. (Selectmen Recommend)

Article 6 moved by Gail Cromwell, second by John Kieley

Article 6 passed by unanimous voice vote.

Article 7: To see if the town will vote to create an expendable trust fund under the provisions of RSA 31:19-a, to be known as the Culvert and Bridge Maintenance and Repair Expendable Trust, for the purpose of culvert and bridge maintenance and repair and to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen Thousand Five Hundred dollars (\$15,500.00) for this fund and to name the Board of Selectmen as agents to expend from this fund. (Selectmen Recommend)

Article 7 moved by Mike Darnell, second by Gail Cromwell

Article 7 passed by unanimous voice vote.

Article 8: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$11,000 to contract with FairPoint Communications to expand and upgrade their DSL broadband services in Temple to include our un-served and under-served citizens. (By Petition). (Selectmen Recommend)

Article 8 moved by John Kieley, second by Mike Darnell

Request to Table rejected by voice vote.

Secret Ballot Request accepted.

Article 8 passed by ballot vote: YES: 83 NO: 60

Article 9: To see if the Town will vote to permanently protect the Temple Town Forest, Map 09 Lot 11, by placing a conservation easement on the land. Such easement to be held by the Monadnock Conservancy (or other qualified non-profit land conservation organization) and would guarantee public access, agriculture and silviculture; uses such as hunting and motor vehicles would be under the control of the Selectmen. Any costs of the easement would be met through the Town's Conservation Fund subject to a public hearing and confirmation by the Selectmen.

Article 9 moved by Gail Cromwell, second by Ray Lee

Article 9 amended by town attorney:

"To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to permanently protect the Temple Town Forest, Map 09 Lot 11, by negotiating and conveying a conservation restriction on the land in accordance with RSA 477:45-47 and subject to such terms and conditions as the Selectmen deem necessary and appropriate. Such restrictions will be held by a qualified non-profit land conservation organization. Such restriction would guarantee public access, agriculture and silviculture; uses such as hunting and motor vehicles would be under the control of the Selectmen. Any costs of the easement would be met through the Town's Conservation Fund subject to a public hearing and confirmation by the Selectmen.

Amended wording moved by Allan Pickman, second by Mike Darnell Article 9 passed as amended, by voice vote.
