Tim has had an enormous impact on the quality of life in our Town for which we will all be forever thankful.



#### Warrant Articles 2020

To the inhabitants of the Town of Temple, in the County of Hillsborough, in the State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to come to the polling place at the Temple Town Hall, 9 Main St., in said Temple, on Tuesday, the Tenth day of March 2020, at Seven o'clock in the morning through Seven o'clock in the evening to vote on the following article:

**Article 1: Election of Officers:** To cast your ballots for the election of all officers required to be elected to serve the Town of Temple for the ensuing term.

You are further notified to meet at the Temple Elementary School, 830 NH 45, in said Temple, on Saturday, the Fourteenth Day of March 2020 next, at ten o'clock in the morning, to act on the remaining articles 2-14.

Article 2: Appropriate Town Operating Budget: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of 1 million one-hundred-ninety-five thousand six-hundred-sixty-eight dollars (\$1,195,668) for town charges as the operating budget and other necessary maintenance and operating expenditures. This article does not include appropriations contained in special or individual articles addressed separately.

(Select Board Recommend)

**Article 3: Paving:** To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of forty five thousand dollars (\$45,000) for the Highway Department paving projects planned for 2020.

(CIP, Select Board Recommend)

Article 4: Asphalt and Paving Expendable Trust: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred forty thousand dollars (\$140,000) to be placed into the Asphalt and Paving Expendable Trust, previously established by Article 4 at the 2010 Town Meeting. (CIP, Select Board Recommend)

**Article 5: Highway Dept. Mowing Unit Purchase:** To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of thirty two thousand dollars (\$32,000) for the purchase of a new mowing unit for the Highway Department tractor. (CIP, Select Board Recommend)

Article 6: Second Payment (of three) on the Highway Dept. Backhoe Lease: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of thirty-eight thousand, three hundred eighty-two dollars (\$38,382) for the second payment (of three) on the Highway Department backhoe lease-purchase authorized by Article 5 at the 2019 town meeting.

(CIP, Select Board Recommend)

Article 7: Fire Department Purchase of a Thermal Imager: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of six thousand, eight hundred eighty dollars (\$6,880) for the purchase of a Thermal Imager for the use by the Fire Department.

(CIP Recommend)

Article 8: Establish Committee to research town land and cove: To see if the town will vote to establish a committee to research town land, determine its suitability for various uses, work with the townspeople to recommend how said land should be managed, and to raise and appropriate \$3,000 to cover expenses related to soil testing, surveying, and other expenses needed to determine said suitability.

(Select Board Recommend)

Article 9: Adopt RSA 466:31 and RSA 466:31-A: To see if the town will vote to adopt RSA 466:31 and RSA 466:31-A of the New Hampshire State Animal Statute for the provisions of Dogs a Menace, a Nuisance or Vicious and Penalty. (Select Board Recommend)

Article 10: Charitable Contribution: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of seventy-five dollars (\$75) for the Conval End 68 Hours of Hunger charity. (This expenditure would become part of the budget in subsequent years if passed).

(Select Board Recommend)

## Warrant Articles 2020

Article 11: Charitable Contribution: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500) for the Cornucopia charity. (This expenditure would become part of the budget in subsequent years if passed).

(Select Board Recommend)

Article 12: For Historical Society of Temple to build a museum: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Historical Society of Temple to build a museum on town-owned land adjacent to Temple Schoolhouse No. 6. The size and external design of the museum shall be subject to approval by the Select Board.

(By petition)

**Article 13: Two Radar Speed Signs:** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of six-thousand eight-hundred dollars (\$6800) to purchase two radar speed signs to be placed on West Road.

(By petition) (CIP Recommended) (Select Board Recommend)

## Select Board Report

The Select Board has continued its work to modernize the operations of the town office to provide better accounting controls, more efficient work procedures, and updated equipment. The office is now working smoothly with clear separation of jobs. A new phone system has been installed, and a new shredder purchased.

Quickbooks is now fully integrated into our financial process. As a result, we have better reporting, accountability, and cash management. Revenues can now flow seamlessly from Tax Collector all the way to Treasurer.

The town website continues to be improved and now has a useable online calendar as well as much better layout and searching capabilities. We anticipate more changes over 2020 to make it even better. Suggestions from the public are welcome and can be submitted via email to boardassistant@templenh.org or can be dropped off at the town offices.

The board has been updating its policy manual and is also preparing to adopt a new financial procedures manual developed with the Budget Advisory Committee. Together, these help solve a long-standing problem of having various procedures in scattered board minutes instead of one cohesive document.

2019 has been a challenging year for both our Highway and Police departments. We are faced with the same problem many New Hampshire towns face, the lack of available qualified workers. Both departments are understaffed; small towns can't match the pay available elsewhere. The board has been working with both departments to overhaul our pay system, including such things as having official pay grades with a clear path for employee progression.

We would like to thank our prior staff. Paul, our board assistant and Alanna, our webmaster, found better pay outside of the area. They will be missed. Please welcome our new staff: board assistant Carole Singelais, bookkeeper Julie Dean, and webmaster Carol Mamczak.

Finally, the board would like to express our gratitude to all the office personnel for keeping the town working smoothly. Thanks to Elizabeth Maxcy-Humphrey, Joyce Kullgren, and Peter Allen.

### Capital Improvement Program Report

The New Hampshire legislature established RSA 674:5-8 to encourage towns to develop Capital Improvement Plans in order to anticipate and plan financially for major expenses. Temple's first Capital Improvement Plan (CIP), developed in 2004 with assistance from the Town's Departments, was intended to be a living document. The CIP Committee updates the plan each year to reflect the Town's changing needs, providing recommendations to the Select Board for consideration at Town Meeting.

The CIP Committee's goal is to keep the Capital Improvements budget as flat as possible, while emphasizing protection of current infrastructure and town services. In 2019/20 the CIP Committee met and/or communicated with each town department, reviewing and discussing all potential revisions for the 2020-2029 CIP Plan. To assure continuity of discussion from year to year, each department also provides a CIP Expenditure Request Form as well as up-to-date quotes for all items requested.

We encourage all departments to research and apply for available grants and Temple's Fire Department, Highway Department and Municipal Office have successfully secured grants (see Fire Truck below). We encourage early applications so we can better plan for a smooth bottom line.

A copy of this year's CIP report, including the narrative and spreadsheet, may be obtained at Town Meeting, at the Municipal Building or online at TempleNH.org.

#### CIP highlights for 2020:

Paving Moved to CIP: In October 2019, by unanimous vote of the CIP Committee and the Budget Advisory Committee, with consent of the Select Board, the decision was made to shift asphalt and paving expenditures from the Town's operational budget to the CIP. This reflects the true nature of these projects as capital improvements. With a number of significant paving projects planned over the next several years, this will enable use of the CIP planning process to level out the year-to-year tax impact of these costs, beginning in 2020. The expenditures will be voted on as warrant articles at Town Meeting, rather than as line items in the Town budget, as in the past.

Capital Reserves: Due to the addition of paving projects to the CIP plan, the Committee is recommending targeting a consistent, yearly tax impact of approximately \$260,000 to cover capital improvements. This value was selected based on past data and future projections to be sustainable for the Town's needs into the foreseeable future. As noted above, this will help shield taxpayers from the impact of year-to-year fluctuations in capital expenditures. To achieve this goal, the CIP recommends the use of Capital Reserve accounts (to which funds would be added or subtracted to achieve the targeted tax impact) in conjunction with bond or lease financing when appropriate.

The spreadsheet and graph at the end of this report illustrate the leveling effect afforded by the use of Capital Reserves and Financing. The graph shows the scheduling of asset replacements and expenditures, in dark grey. The effect of using Capital Reserves to spread these expenses over time is shown in light grey.

Fire Truck: The Town received a boost in October of 2019 when it received, pursuant to a grant request, a 2006 American LaFrance pumper truck from the State of New Hampshire Forest Protection Bureau. With an estimated 30-year service life for the truck, this enables the Town to postpone its planned fire truck replacement—estimated to cost \$467,685—from 2024 to 2036 while allowing immediate replacement of the Fire Department's 1993 International pumper. The CIP plan was updated to reflect this exciting development.

Rescheduled Highway Vehicle replacement: In order to help ease the tax impact in 2020, when paving projects are scheduled to begin, the Highway Department has recommended delaying the planned replacement of the Town's 2011 Ford F550 6-wheel dump truck until 2021. The Highway Department plan also calls for replacing the 2006 International 6-wheel dump truck in 2022, at a total cost of \$197,675 spread over three years.

## Capital Improvement Program Report

#### For 2020, the CIP Committee recommends the following:


**Fire Department:** The Committee received a request for a new Thermal Imager at a total cost of \$6,880. This essential life safety device will replace an aging and obsolete piece of equipment.

**Highway Department:** The Committee also received a request for a new Mowing Unit for the department's tractor at a cost of \$32,000 to replace an aging piece of equipment. The CIP plan also calls for the second of three lease/purchase payments of \$38,385 for the Backhoe/Loader acquired in 2019.

Asphalt & Paving: The Committee recommends that the Town raise and appropriate \$185,000 for highway paving, of which \$45,000 would fund projects in 2020 and \$140,000 would be added to the Asphalt & Paving Expendable Trust Fund to reduce the tax impact of paving work on West Road scheduled for 2021, estimated to cost \$248,000. The Committee has worked closely with the Highway Department to review and refine a six-year paving plan for the Town with the goal of meeting road repair and maintenance needs, while leveling the tax impact from year to year. For 2020, the plan calls for chip sealing of Main Street and Firehouse Lane, plus culvert replacement, crack sealing and sand sealing of West Road from the Town center to Fish Road. For 2021, the plan calls for critically needed paving work on West Road from Fish Road to Spofford Gap.

#### **Budget Advisory Committee**

The Budget Advisory Committee (BAC) worked in coordination with the Capital Improvement Planning Committee (CIP) to deliver a combined budget and capital expenditures proposal to the Temple Select Board (SB) for 2020. For much of the department interview phase, we held joint meetings to gather information for our respective processes. This promoted improved understanding and appreciation for the combined budgeting effort. A significant outcome was to transfer responsibility of the monetary plan for the Highway Department (HW) Asphalt and Paving activity from the BAC to the CIP. This was done because the HW's eight year plan for maintenance and re-surfacing our roads contained high variation in year-on-year expenditures that are better suited to the cost smoothing approach of the CIP. In 2019, the HW spent \$144k on Asphalt and Paving. This year's BAC proposed operating budget for 2020 is \$1,190,167 (\$172k below 2019.) When the BAC Budget is combined with Warrant Articles proposed by the CIP, the result is \$1,452,432 which is \$10,527 above the 2019 Budget.

Caveats: Some but not all potential salary increases are included in the proposed budget. The cost of the Wilton Ambulance Service (WAS) remains in contention; the BAC utilized the value consistent with Temple's contract with WAS: \$40,200 (11% based on call rate) and Wilton has requested \$57,798 (an arbitrary 16.3%).

#### The items of note having a negative impact:

- 1) The Police CoOp costs are up 10% to \$256,000
- 2) The cost for service at the Wilton Recycle Center is up 22% to \$77,792 due primarily to the lack of markets for waste materials.
- 3) Maintenance and repair of Government Buildings is up 63% to \$15,500.
- 4) The addition of line items for the Village Green and Holiday Lighting Committees is \$7,000

#### The items of note having a positive impact:

- 1) Debt Service costs have gone to \$0, freeing up \$32,542 for other expenditures.
- 2) Payments for Assessing services have gone down to \$9,480 from \$31,020 as the full town assessment was completed in 2019.
- 3) Cemetery repair and maintenance is down to \$1,000 from \$3,500 reflecting the completion of the headstone restoration process.
- 4) Data processing maintenance and software costs are down to \$9,000 from \$11,000 due to the use of a less expensive bookkeeping system

The BAC is most appreciative of the time and support provided by the SB and department heads.

During the course of our 2018 audit we identified certain areas where improvements and/or efficiencies could be made that were not included in a formal management letter. The following summarizes these issues very briefly:

- Disbursement testing results showed 4 out of 25 selected invoices not having signed documentation of approval. We recommend all invoices be signed by a knowledgeable individual.
- The recreation special revenue fund bank account reconciliation did not include a list of outstanding checks. We recommend that a list of issued, cleared, and outstanding checks be maintained for the recreation checking account.
- Payroll testing results showed 3 out of 25 employees not having approved rate agree-ments for the pay periods selected. We recommend that an approved rate agreement be retained in each employee's personnel file.
- Payroll testing results showed 3 out of 25 employees timesheets did not include documented approvals. We recommend that all time sheets include documented approval by an individual of higher authority than the time sheet being reviewed.
- Final adjusted budget was not updated in the general ledger system. We recommend that the final budget be updated in the system to allow for budget versus actual reports to be generated.
- Formal policies and procedures have not been adopted for procurement. We recom-mend that a Town-wide policy be implemented to provide guidance over
- Accounts payable balance at year-end was in a debit position. We recommend that this account be reconciled on a regular basis to ensure accuracy.

We encourage the Town implement these recommendations in order to improve controls and efficiencies. I will be available to discuss these with you in more detail at your convenience.

After working for the department for a few months it was my good fortune to be appointed Road Agent, which helped make for a smooth transition. Long-time employee Steve Harling continues to be an asset to the department in many ways.

Finding a qualified replacement for the open position has proven difficult, and this is due to several factors. After talking to various State and town sheds in the area it is clear these type of jobs continue to go unfilled due to an 'aging out' of people willing to do this kind of work. Experienced employees are at a premium right now. Also, obtaining a CDL license has become more difficult and expensive. And of course the weather is a huge factor in what we do. The winters are especially tricky as we deal with less actual snowfall and more storms that bring rain, sleet, and ice. Hopefully by the time you read this a third person has been welcomed on board.


This year the town agreed to a lease-purchase agreement for a new 420 Caterpillar backhoe, which should serve the town well for many years to come.

Prices for asphalt, sand, salt, and other materials continue to increase, and there is a new 10-year paving plan to help smooth out costs for maintaining our town roads.


Kai Nalenz of Gravestone Services came in again to repair several of the old headstones.

### Temple-Greenville Police Department

In 2018 the greatest issue facing the Police Department was manpower. This has continued throughout 2019. In years past it was hard to retain officers primarily due to wages. The Joint Police Board and I have worked hard to fix this issue. We have reviewed various police wage studies from around the state and have even conducted our own. In the event that the towns pass the 2020 budget, this issue will be resolved for the time being.

The more difficult problem is finding good candidates. There are several reasons for this: the good economy, basic hiring standards, the job isn't desirable, and the abundance of police positions available throughout the state. The Temple-Greenville Police Department has always had high standards for hiring an officer. This is reflected in the fact that four of our former officers have become Police Chiefs.

The 2019 crime statistics for both towns show that the majority of crimes committed has stayed roughly the same as 2018. The good news is reportable accidents declined by almost 50%.

Through the years I try to thank someone or a group of people for their help and/or support of the department. This year I thank the men and women of the NH State Highway Department of Transportation in Temple and Greenville for their dedication in maintaining our roads in all types of conditions.

#### Town of Wilton Ambulance Service



### Volunteer Fire/Rescue Department

2019 Where did it go? Temple Volunteer Fire Department responded to 101 calls for the year. We have been averaging about 100-110 calls a year. We provided Mutual Aid to other towns 11 times this year. We had a slight increase in medical calls this year in town.

This year we had 3 new members join us. Olivia Trempe, Murray Collette and Summer Northrup. Welcome aboard!

This year I put in for assistance through the State Forestry FEPP program and was awarded an 2006 American Lafrance Engine. This Engine did not cost the town any money and any maintenance or repairs are being done through the FD budget. This will allow us to come up with a plan on what to do with our current Engine which is almost 25 years old. This was a big score for the town and FD.

I am currently working on another assistance program to help with a different forestry truck. Fingers crossed.

The number of structure fires in the fire service has declined, which is great. In 2019 I brought in a training company called New England Fire Training, who has created their own props to help train and stay well prepared in structure fire knowledge. This year we completed a confidence maze, Search and Rescue, Hose advancement and FF down scenarios. Would like to give a big Thank you, to Chris Grover for working with us and we look forward to continuing our partnership in 2020. As Chief I look forward to working with all the members of the department and the Officers in 2020 as we continue to improve our department.

TVFD is always looking for volunteers to come join us. As a volunteer department we are looking for assistance in any capacity that an individual is able to give. ## Temple Town Forester

For the tax year April 1, 2018 through March 31, 2019, the Town received two Reports of Wood or Timber Cut. Yield taxes assessed for these harvesting operations totaled \$2266.43. As of December 28, 2019, three Intents to Cut have been filed with the Town for the current tax year. There was a significant decrease in the amount of timber harvests conducted in Town last year as compared to the prior year. Good quality white pine and hardwood however, continue to be in demand. Hardwood stumpage prices, especially for red oak, have remained fairly consistent over the past couple of years and still remain strong. The veneer market still seems to be the driving force behind demand and prices. The markets for pine, hemlock, & hardwood pulp have greatly improved compared to last year. Whole-tree chips are moving but prices still remain low. As a result landowners should not expect to receive the type of income we were getting several years ago for tops and low-grade that is chipped this year.

The State RSA specifies that any person owning land upon which wood or timber is cut, either for sale or for services rendered, must first file an Intent to Cut form with the Town Selectmen or assessing officials. The exception to this is a person cutting up to 10,000 board feet of logs or up to 20 cords of fuel wood for either their own use or for a land conversion. Under these exceptions an individual does not have to file an Intent to Cut form. The tax year runs from April 1st to March 31st.

The RSA also states that within 60 days of completion of the operation or by May 15th, a Report of Wood or Timber Cut must be filed with the Town specifying the exact volume cut by species. The Town will levy a 10 percent yield tax based on the stumpage value of the material cut. This value is not based on the actual price paid for the forest products but on average values provided by the State. If the job is not completed by March 31st or did not take place, a Report of Cut must still be filed by May 15th. At that time a new Intent to Cut should be filed to renew the permit. If the job is not completed by March 31st but will be completed by June 30th, a 90-day extension may be granted without having to renew the permit. To do this the Selectmen must be notified in writing by the Owner, prior to May 15th. Finally, during a harvesting operation, if the volumes to be harvested are going to exceed the estimated volumes on the original Intent to Cut, a supplemental Intent should be filed immediately showing the additional estimated volumes.

Landowners considering a timber harvest should be aware that there are State harvesting regulations that must be followed. If you have any questions regarding this or the permitting process, you can contact me through the Selectmen's Office.

## Forest Fire Warden & State Forest Ranger

This past year we were fortunate enough to have favorable weather conditions in the spring and summer which limited the amount of wildfire activity throughout the state. Your local fire departments and the Division of Forests & Lands worked throughout the year to protect homes and the forests. The statewide system of 16 fire lookout towers continues to operate on high fire danger days. The towers' fire detection efforts were supplemented by the NH Civil Air Patrol when the fire danger was especially high.

Many homes in New Hampshire are located in the wildland urban interface, which is the area where homes and flammable wildland fuels intermix. Every year New Hampshire sees fires which threaten to destroy structures, a constant reminder that wildfires burn more than just trees. Homeowners should take measures to prevent a wildfire from spreading to their home. Precautions include keeping your roof and gutters clear of leaves and pine needles, and maintaining adequate green space around your home free of flammable materials. Please help Smokey Bear, your local fire department, and the state's Forest Rangers by being fire wise and fire safe!


The Forest Protection Bureau and local fire departments were very busy this year celebrating Smokey Bear's 75th year preventing wildfires. Many events were held at local libraries, in fact, this program was so successful we will be offering it again in 2020. We were fortunate enough to partner with the Northeast Forest Fire Protection Compact and bring the Smokey Hot Air Balloon to Franconia Notch in August. The weather was fantastic and hundreds of people go the chance to rid in the balloon! Smokey's message has always been about personal responsibility – remember his ABC's: Always Be Careful with fire. If you start a fire, put it out when you are done. Remember, Only You Can Prevent Wildfires!

As we prepare for the 2020 fire season, please remember to contact your local Forest Fire Warden or Fire Department to determine if a fire permit is required before doing <u>ANY</u> outside burning. Under State law (RSA 227-L:17) a fire permit is required for all outside burning, unless the ground is completely covered with snow. Fire permits are also available online in most towns and may be obtained by visiting <u>www.NHfirepermit.com</u>. The burning of household waste is prohibited by the Air Resources Division of the Department of Environmental Services (DES). You are

encouraged to contact the local fire department or DES at 603-271-3503 or <a href="www.des.nh.gov">www.des.nh.gov</a> for more information. Safe open burning requires your diligence and responsibility. Thank you for helping us to protect New Hampshire's forest resources. The Humane Society has reported that rabies is higher in cats than in other years. Please, if you are going to let your cats roam make sure they have been vaccinated for rabies, distemper, and any other diseases that your Vet recommends. The best advice is to keep your cats indoorsg

Dog Owners please remember that all dogs over the age of 4 months old must be licensed by April 30th of each year, RSA 466:1. The dog tag should be placed on a collar that is around the dogs neck. Not only will this help me return your pet if it gets lost, but it is the State law.

The Zoning Board of Adjustment (ZBA) has responsibility under State statutes to consider:


- Variances to the Town's Zoning Ordinance

### Planning Board

In January we adopted three revised chapters to the Master Plan: "Population and Housing Analysis", "Economic Development Analysis", and "Transportation". The Southwest Regional Planning Commission assisted us with much of the revision work.

Much of our attention this year has been focused on the issue of affordable housing. The number of students at the elementary school is less than half of what it was twenty five years ago, largely because young families cannot afford to buy or rent housing in town. There have been frequent discussions at the Conval School Board about reducing district costs by closing the Temple Elementary School and other small schools. The school is one of the things that makes Temple the wonderful community that it is.

Affordable housing is a measurement of the total cost of housing (whether it is rent, or mortgage payments, property taxes, utilities, insurance and heat) compared to income. The Board held two public forums on the subject, which have been well attended. Many comments were made about preserving the towns rural character.

The board is proposing three changes to the Zoning Ordinance that we feel will make more affordable housing more available to young families as well as our aging population which no longer needs large houses and extensive landscaping, while at the same time help preserve open space and rural appearance.

The first change would be to allow duplexes, as long as they were built on a standard size lot. This would allow a homeowner the chance for rental income, and costs would be reduced by the need for only one driveway, foundation, septic system and well. Setbacks would be increased, to minimize visual impacts and proximity to neighbors.

The second amendment would allow more units to be built in a Planned Residential Development if they were limited in size. The average house built in Temple in the last ten years or so is greater that 2,400 square feet in size. For every two houses of 1,600 square feet or less in a PRD, a third could be built of the same size. Again, increased buffers would minimize the visual impact, and more open space would be preserved than would occur in a conventional subdivision or the under the current PRD rules.

The third option would allow greater flexibility in creating accessory dwelling units.

The Board encourages you vote in favor of these changes on the ballot box on March 10th.

My thanks go to all the Board members for all their hard work and dedication during the past year, and to the many people who attended the forums and hearings. I would especially like to thank Betsy Perry who has retired from being the Board's clerk for decades, and former member Ted Sartell for his contributions to the Board.

#### **Conservation Commission**

2019 was another successful year for the Temple Conservation Commission.

New members and officers: The Conservation Commission welcomes new commissioner and long time Temple resident Carol Mamczak. Carol has Land Stewardship training. Sean Radcliffe transferred secretarial duties to Cathy Joly. Lincoln Geiger handed the commission chair to Ult Mundane for several months but Scott Hecker is the current chair of the commission.

Water testing project: The Conservation Commission conducted its annual water testing and awareness event on April 10, 2019. The DES Lou Barinelli gave a presentation on water testing.

The Commission distributed water-testing kits at the presentation to interested attendees. Homeowners chose which tests they wanted to pay for since drilled wells and dug wells have different risks. Commission members collected the kits and delivered them to the Concord testing site. Homeowners received test results directly. Individual well results are private and not shared with the Conservation Commission or town officials.

Plans are underway to continue well water education and testing in 2020.

**Town Forest Trails:** The Conservation Commission began a project to improve the trail markers and trail quality for the trails in the Town Forest. The project is on going into 2020.

**Newsletter:** The Conservation Commission started work on a bi-annual newsletter. We expect the first edition of the newsletter to be available in the next few months.

Goals and mission statement: The Conservation Commission continued to develop goals and a mission statement to publicly clarify the Commission's responsibilities, activities, and processes.

**Holiday Fair:** The Conservation Commission again had a table at Temple's Holiday Fair. The Commission looks forward to continuing this practice.

Private land conservation projects: The Conservation Commission continues working with Temple citizens interested in having conservation easements on their land. The Commission will continue to assist landowners interested in conservation in 2020.

Resource and environmental threats: The commission continues to research and support the town concerning environmental threats ranging from invasive insects and species to wetland and aquifer contamination.

### Renewable Energy Task Force

Temple's Renewable Energy Task Force has been meeting monthly to study and evaluate the most cost-effective and viable options for converting Temple's municipal energy usage to 100% renewable energy by 2030, as directed by Warrant Article 11 approved at Temple's 2018 Town Meeting.

#### Task Force actions:

- We have collected the energy usage data from 2017 present for our municipal sector to assess the demands for each building.
- We obtained a professional energy audit for Town Hall and the Annex, since neither building had been previously audited or retrofitted for its energy efficiency.
- We held separate meetings with the Director of Clean Energy Finance at the NH Community Development Finance Authority (CDFA) and the Director of Local Energy Solutions at Clean Energy NH to discuss the financial assistance options for various potential renewable energy solutions.
- We invited three reputable renewable energy installers to conduct site visits for our municipal buildings, review our energy usage data and recommend costneutral renewable energy options.
- We investigated the pros and cons for various potential locations in town for roof and/or ground mounted solar arrays.
- Additionally, we explored the possibility of installing an electric vehicle (EV) charging station in Temple to support the conversion of municipal and residential vehicles to electric power.
- We provided a booth at the 2019 Harvest Festival with informative materials on renewable energy resources; ran a slide show presentation about our Task Force's process, and where we were available to speak to visitors interested in learning more about our research and actions.
- We created a page for Temple's town website specifically to share our process and progress;
- And we created a page called "Renewables Task Force" for the Energy Committee's website, www.teec.info, to share information on the benefits of converting to renewable energy sources as well as our Task Force news.

#### Going Forward

We will present our recommendations to the Select Board, to Temple citizens at public hearings, and eventually as warrant articles at Town Meetings. And we will assist in overseeing the planning, financial arrangements, and installation for whichever renewable energy installations have been selected until we reach 100% renewable energy for our municipal sector by 2030.

## Temple Town Hall Advisory Committee

The TTHAC's mission is to help protect the Town Hall's historic, functional and financial values on behalf of all Temple residents, ensuring it will continue to serve the community as the vibrant center for education, enrichment and general enjoyment as it has been for generations. Our role is to support the Select Board in an advisory capacity, monitor the Hall's use and condition, and advise them on any issues that may impact the facility's functionality or appearance. The TTHAC also assists the Town in fulfilling the terms of its Stewardship Agreement with the NH Land and Community Heritage Investment Program (LCHIP).

On August 7, 2019 Paul Clifton-Waite, Assistant to the Temple Select Board, received an email requesting a special visit/inspection of the Temple Town Hall by Ms. Kristen Powell, LCHIP Historic Resources Intern. Ron Pulos, past TTHAC President, and committee member, Dick Benotti, agreed to meet with her August 14, 2019. Following the meeting Ron reported Ms. Powell completed a very thorough inspection both of the interior and exterior of the building. At the end of her site tour Ms. Powell reported that our Town Hall "is by far, in fact ... far and away" the most beautifully maintained building she has seen and that Temple is doing "A great job!" The TTHAC thanks the Town and the Select Board for the ongoing financial commitment to maintaining our beloved Town Hall.

It was noted at our November meeting when the TTHAC completed their regular annual LCHIP inspection that the Main Hall floor, refinished during the summer of 2019, already had some fairly deep scratches. Dick Benotti agreed to contact Rodney Thompson, Juniors Hardwood Flooring. Dick met with Rodney and reported that the last coat of finish did not properly adhere and the solution is to buff the floors down to the original wood and apply a new finish coat. This will be expensive but appears to be a longer-term solution toward resolving this ongoing issue. It should also be noted that on our recommendation, the Select Board approved a commercial cleaning of the Annex rug that was completed in early December.

The regular "2019 LCHIP Historic Resources Annual Monitoring Report", completed on behalf of the Select Board and was approved and submitted by them in November.

#### **REMINDERS:**

The Fees, Rules, Regulations & Reservation Form updated in April of 2019 is available on line at TempleNH.org. Approved Quasi Municipal Organizations as well as a definition of Quasi-Organizations (exempt from fees for meeting of organizational members only) and a definition of Special Events is included. Special Events require the completion of the reservation form as well as the required deposit. Be aware that Select Board approval for a fee waiver can only be given at public SB meetings. Please time your request accordingly. The SB now reserves the right to deny use of this facility to any group, organization or individual not complying with these policies.

### Village Green Committee

The Village Green Committee's mission is to support and carry out projects that focus on the maintenance, improvement and beautification of town-owned green areas in the Town of Temple.

Early in the year we realized that some trees on the Common were declining due to age and environmental stresses. We invited our county forester to tour the Common with the committee and provide a report with action items. We identified one tree in need of immediate replacement. Tim Fiske and crew were able to remove the old maple for us. We successfully fundraised with the help of many townspeople to purchase a replacement red maple that was planted by the highway department. Volunteers ensured that the tree stayed hydrated throughout the summer and fall.

The familiar white box planters were once again filled with geraniums and compatible plants to brighten the center of town. Thanks to volunteers these were watered throughout the summer.

We hired an arborist to provide guidance in caring for the newer red maples and developed a plan for their maintenance and healthy growth. The soil was tested by UNH labs, and a report was provided to guide us in choosing the correct fertilizers for optimum health of both the trees and the lawn area. We worked with the Holiday Lighting Committee to determine trenching paths for the underground wiring that would not negatively impact the trees.

Reports from the county forester and the arborist, along with soil test results and a list the committee's priorities for addressing the remaining ailing sugar maples were presented to the select board in the fall. The board approved winter removal of selected trees along route 45, and with grant money awarded by the 250th Anniversary Fund, we will purchase two new trees for that area this spring.

The harvest table at the Harvest Festival featured traditional Annie's baked beans, vegetarian beans, cornbread, locally grown vegetables, other donated items and a raffle. Thank-you all who supported this VGC fundraising effort.

In December, VGC members hung fresh wreaths on buildings in the center of town and at the municipal building. We also hung wreaths on the Common and Schoolhouse #6. Purchasing and hanging wreaths has long been a VGC tradition, and we are pleased with how they complement the tree lights on the Common.

The VGC welcomes volunteers. Many hands will be needed this spring to assist with mulching and throughout this summer watering the planters. Click on the "Contact Us" link on the town web page at templenh.org.

### 250th Anniversary Fund

In 2019, the Anniversary Fund Advisory Committee reviewed applications and approved two projects for awards. We also discussed possible projects for the future, and heard from committees and individuals we hope to hear from again in 2020, with more good ideas.

### Monadnock Family Services

MMonadnock Family Services (MFS) continues to assist the residents of Temple who are in need of quality mental health counseling and rehabilitation services. In addition to providing the region's only 24/7 emergency mental health crisis services, MFS offers a variety of innovative treatment programs. Among them



are mental health evaluation and treatment, medication evaluation and monitoring, counseling, and specialized group services for adults. Our programs for children and families continue to support and promote good mental health in children and their family members. Our Substance Abuse Services program helps individuals of all ages to develop new, healthier behaviors and make positive changes in their lives. The enclosed card lists some of the other programs and services we provide.

Your ongoing financial support will benefit your friends and neighbors receiving help at MFS, and we hope that our partnership in caring for the residents of Temple will continue. We also pursue many other funding opportunities such as Monadnock United Way, grants, foundations and local fundraising efforts conducted in concert with our Board of Directors. Each source, however, helps with only a portion of the total cost of care.

We thank you for your past financial support and ask for your continued allocation to help underwrite the cost of services we provide to the uninsured and underinsured individuals in your community. In FY 2019, MFS provided over \$7,019.00 in discounts to the consumers in Temple. We expect that an additional \$4,088.00 will likely be written off as uncollectible. To help close this gap, we are asking for the equivalent of \$1.25 for each resident of Temple which, based on the 2010 US Census, amounts \$1,708.00. ## Child Advocacy Center

Thank you very much for the Town of Temple \$1,500 contribution, received in April 2019, to the Child Advocacy Center of Hillborough County (CAC). We respectfully request a \$2,000 contribution to the CAC to help support operations that serve children of Temple.

The CAC has partnered effectively with Temple Police Department and DCYF to serve child victims of abuse living in the Town of Temple. A nationwide study entitled The Economic Impact of Child Maltreatment found that communities using the child advocacy center model save \$1,300 per case. During the past fiscal year, the CAC served nine child victims living in the Town of Temple – across the County, the number of reported abuse cases increased 23% to over 400 cases.

Our agency's primary mission is to provide a safe and supportive place for children and their families to talk about abuse that they have suffered from. By doing so, we reduce the trauma experienced by the children and increase the likelihood of prosecution. We also recognize that educating the community on the signs and symptoms of child abuse is an important step in preventing abuse. The CAC regularly provides trainings and educational programs to local organizations, professionals and parents.

The CAC provides its services free of charge to all children ages 3 to 17 living in Hillsborough County who are alleging child abuse. In addition to working with the child, the CAC provides support to the non-offending caregivers and empowers them to protect and support their children.

The CAC first opened its doors in Nashua in November 2004. A northern office was opened in Manchester in July 2007.

### Community Volunteer Transportation Co.

Overall, CVTC registered 3,336 rides and drove 97,587 miles for 309 individual riders from 29 out of 34 towns in the Monadnock region. 85 Volunteer Drivers donated 5,129 hours for a value of \$76,935. In 2019, we received funding from 20 towns.

#### Temple statistics for 2019:

- We received 55 ride requests from 6 Temple residents. 7 out of 55 rides did not take place because no driver selected the ride.
- Volunteer Drivers logged in 1,957 miles and donated 95 hours of service for a value of \$1,425.00 (at \$15/hour NHDOT rate).
- O Volunteer Drivers live in Temple. Other drivers helped to cover these rides. 0 residents took wheelchair vans, covered by CVTC.

We request that Temple supports our good work by continuing your annual donation of \$500.

Town funding represents \$14,500 (6%) of this year's operating budget of \$230,687. 43% of the budget is federal dollars. The remaining 57% is raised from individuals, businesses, foundations and municipalities

### St. Joseph Community Services, Inc.

For many years, the Town of Temple has supported our services. I am writing to ask if the Town of Temple would once again consider supporting St. Joseph Community Services Meals on Wheels and Community Dining programs. We provide nutrition, a safety check and social engagement which enable the homebound, older and disabled adults in the town to live dignified, independent lives. For 22% of our clients, the Meals on Wheels driver is the only person they will see all week..

Meals on Wheels and Community Dining are not entitlement programs. While our program is funded by the state, there is a limit to the amount of meals funded under our contract. Moreover, the money provided does not cover the full cost of a meal. It was never intended to. Rather, it is expected that agencies like St. Joseph Community Services would raise the remainder of the funds from the communities it serves. Therefore, the funding that we receive from the cities and towns in our service area of Hillsborough County is essential to our ability to continue to meet the needs of everyone who asks for our help.

Last year, we served 12 Temple residents. Of these, 2 were served under our Title XX Program, which is sponsored by the County of Hillsborough. We are requesting funding of \$85 for each of the remaining clients.

The meeting thanked Elizabeth Maxcy-Humphrey, Gail Cromwell and Jeanne Whitcomb for their years of service. Kullgren read the list of newly elected candidates. (Town wide vote was held on Tuesday, March 12th.)

**Article 1:** To cast your ballots for the election of all officers required to be elected to serve the Town of Temple for the ensuing year.

**Article 4:** To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one million, four hundred forty-one thousand, nine hundred six dollars (\$1,441,906) for town charges as the operating budget and other necessary maintenance and operating expenditures. (Select Board recommend)

Tim Fiske spoke to article 5.

Article 5: To see if the town will vote to authorize the select board to enter into a 3 year lease/purchase agreement in the amount of \$109,500 for the purpose of leasing a Backhoe for the Highway Department and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$38,500 for the first year's payment for that purpose. This lease agreement contains an escape clause. (Majority vote required) (Select Board Recommend)

**Article 12:** To see whether the Town, pursuant to the authority of RSA 155-A:7, will authorize the Select Board, or their agent and/or designee, to enforce the provisions of the state building code as contemplated in said statute and to have all the authority necessary to implement a local enforcement process as contemplated in RSA 674:51, (I); and, further, to authorize the said Select Board, or their agent and/or designee, to issue permits for construction activities governed by the state building code, appeals from the granting or denial of which shall be appealable to the zoning board of adjustment as provided in RSA 673:1, (V). Further, to authorized the Select Board, pursuant to the authority of RSA 674:51, (I), to establish fees to be charged for building permits, inspections and for any certificate of occupancy issued pursuant to construction. (Select Board Recommend)

Article 13: To see if the town will vote to adopt an ordinance waiving the fee to be charged for a permit to register one motor vehicle owned by any person who was captured and incarcerated for 30 days or more while serving in a qualified war or armed conflict as defined in RSA 72:28V, and who was honorably discharged, provided the person has provided the Town Clerk with satisfactory proof of these circumstances. (Select Board Recommend)

Article 14: To see if the town will vote to re-establish the position of Town Administrative Assistant. This position to be full-time (40 hours per week) with benefits equal to those of the other full-time employees, and to instruct the Select Board to hire a person qualified in municipal government. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of not more than \$50,000 per year salary, depending on qualifications, and not more than \$30,000 (or the maximum given other full-time employees) per year in benefits. The intention of this article is to eliminate the current part-time positions currently in place and to provide adequate and improved customer service for the Residents, Tax Payers, and Visitors to the Temple Town Offices. 
